Commonly Asked Questions

• What will happen during the first visit?

 You will meet with the therapist(s) to learn about the program services. During this meeting, you will be able to talk about your/your child's needs and expectations for therapy. After you have signed a consent form, the client will be evaluated to determine their therapy needs.

• Is there an income requirement for services?

 There are no income requirements to receive MTP services. Client eligibility is based on age (birth to 21), residency in Ventura County, and a program-eligible diagnosis.

• Does a doctor need to make a referral?

 Anyone can make an initial referral to the MTP, including hospital and clinic personnel, parents, teachers, self-referral, etc. However, therapy orders and medical records from a CCS-paneled physician will be needed to determine eligibility and begin treatment.

• What are my responsibilities as a program client or parent/guardian?

Your role is important. As part of our program requirements, we ask that you keep your appointments or call if you need to miss one. In a team approach, we ask that you participate in home programs and conferences with therapists, follow up regularly with a physician familiar with your/your child's diagnosis, and share your concerns and expectations.

Medical Therapy Program (MTP)

MTP is a program under California Children's Services (CCS), which provides **physical** and **occupational therapy** services to children and young adults with medically eligible conditions. Medical Therapy Units (MTUs) are outpatient rehab-certified clinics where physical and occupational therapy services are provided. Ventura County has five (5) MTUs, and all are located on school sites.

MTP Services

 Work to maximize independence with mobility and activities of daily living in the home and community environments.



- Evaluate, treat, and consult to develop individualized physical and occupational therapy plans in collaboration with clients, families, and caregivers.
- Determine if special equipment is needed.
- Provide client/parent education about the diagnosis and physical challenges.
- Provide information about community programs and events, such as inclusive sports and recreation.
- Assist in transition to adult services.
- Collaborate with the client's school and participate in Individualized Education Plans (IEP).

Eligibility for MTP is Based on:

- Age (birth to 21)
- Resident of Ventura County
- Medically eligible conditions such as:
 - Cerebral Palsy
 - Neuromuscular conditions with muscle weakness/atrophy, i.e., poliomyelitis, myasthenia gravis, and muscular dystrophy.
 - Chronic musculoskeletal and connective tissue diseases or deformities, such as osteogenesis imperfecta, arthrogryposis, rheumatoid arthritis, amputations, and contractures resulting from burns.
 - Other conditions, such as ataxia, degenerative neurological diseases, or intracranial processes.
 - Children under age 3 who demonstrate neurological findings that suggest a high probability of a physical disability, need to demonstrate two (2) of the following:
 - Exaggeration of or persistence of primary reflexes beyond the normal age (corrected for prematurity).
 - Increased deep tendon reflexes (DTRs) of 3+ or greater.
 - Abnormal posturing as characterized by arms, legs, head, or trunk turned or twisted abnormally.
 - Hypotonicity with normal or increased DTRs in infants below 1 year of age.
 - Asymmetry of motor findings of trunk and/or extremities.

Occupational Therapy

 Evaluate and address limitations in fine motor and visual motor coordination, selffeeding, swallowing, and strength as it relates to completion of activities of daily living.



Physical Therapy

 Evaluate and address limitations in mobility, motor control, balance, muscle strength, joint range of motion, equipment needs, and motor coordination to increase access to home and community.

Both Therapies

- Utilize a team approach, empower clients and families, and provide quality treatment services.
- Develop strategies to facilitate independence in the home and community environment.
- Consult with medical providers, the education team, and equipment vendors.
- Assist in obtaining specialized equipment.
